- Public K 12 charter school in Rock Hill, SC
- Opened in the fall of 2010
- 43 acre campus with 4 buildings
- Current enrollment: 1645 students

Our Background



A Little History:

- YPA began as a Public K-8 Charter School in 2010
- First graduating class in 2015 51 Graduates
- First AP course: AP US History in 2013-2014 with 6 students
 - 46 total 11th graders (No 12th grade class yet) (13%)
 - Struggle to recruit students
 - Faculty fear of AP open enrollment
 - Will we be able to grow and sustain a program?
 - New partnership with local community college for Dual Enrollment same year - AP vs. DE: competing programs?

Tackle Issues

- Director of School Counseling: background in higher education admissions and academic advising - dedicated to college exposure
- New hire: NBCT English teacher with 6 years of AP experience and passion for AP




YPA total enrollment

- 2011-2012: first class of 9th graders
- 2014-2015: first graduating class, 51 seniors
- Charter caps each grade level at 130 students

AP and Dual Enrollment



2013-2014:

- our first class of juniors
- 6 AP students
- 11 dual enrollment students (no overlap)
 - DE: partnership with local 2 year community college
 - School paid tuition and books for enrolled students
 - Encouraged enrollment, but not sustainable long-term model (not cost-effective)



AP Fear: The Student Perspective

We had to address the FEAR + ASSUMPTIONS

- Many of the students attending YPA in the beginning assumed they weren't smart enough
- Transferred to a charter school many running from disciplinary issues, bullying, or trying to find a better academic fit

FEAR

- They had a fear of not doing well, being able to handle and keep up with the workload and failing
- Fear of the unknown they had no role models to lead the way

ASSUMPTIONS

- Assumed it would be impossible
- Assumed teachers would be too tough



AP Fear: The Faculty Perspective

We had to address the FEAR + ASSUMPTIONS

- Began with a very small high school faculty: 1 teacher for English,
 Science, History and Math and an Art and PE teacher
- Few teachers had previous AP teaching experience
 - Unfavorable comparisons between students from "there" to here
- Many of the students they were teaching in the beginning were low achieving and not very motivated

FEAR

- Fear of students failing, not being able to handle the work
- Fear of the unknown they had no role models to lead the way
- Fear of the AP scores negatively impacting their evaluations

ASSUMPTIONS

- Assumed it would be impossible
- Assumed curriculum would be too tough for the students



How did we create a positive change in perspective?

Beginning to build an AP culture - Slowly but Surely

Our sources of growth

- Go AP! program: Created excitement, enthusiasm, potential
- Recruitment: AP Potential reports, teacher recommendations
- Encouragement through Individual Graduation Plan (IGP) meetings
- Building on the success of a few, lead to the excitement of many
- Change in teacher attitudes and student results



Recruitment efforts



- Recruitment and encouragement through AP Potential reports
 - Began offering the PSAT to 8 11th grade in 2015
 - AP Potential is an excellent tool to utilize for recruitment
 - Highlights students abilities and builds up their confidence

- EEDA State Law in South Carolina requires Individual Graduation Plan (IGP) meetings to be conducted with a certified school counselor, student and the student's parent, guardian, or designee every year for grades 8 - 12
 - Time consuming but great opportunity to highlight the AP program and encourage students to consider AP classes

Go AP! Program



- Go AP! program: marketing and recruitment
 - morning announcements, subject teacher encouragement, hall posters, classroom invitations from AP teachers
- Double-blocked, yearlong courses
 - reduces stress on students and faculty; more time to cover and process material
- What does it mean to be an AP student?
 - Work ethic vs. natural intelligence
 - valuing the process over the outcome
- What does it mean to be an AP teacher?
 - Discipline-oriented but focused on growth
 - Commitment to the content and to the students
- Strong support from administration

Go AP! Program

*lunch recruitment sessions with an AP teacher to understand the course focus and expectations



Session goals:

- Increase student awareness and build excitement for AP course offerings
- Reduce fear about the program and expectations
- Introduce students to content and teacher in a low-stakes environment
- Begin to develop a sense of community



Go AP! program



Session Outcomes:

- Awareness increased due to recruitment and marketing efforts
- Interest developed through the Go AP! program
 - from our first year with one class and 6 students (and no real recruitment effort), we grew to three classes with 23 students, almost quadrupling our AP student population
- Added value through former AP students talked to the potential students and give them a realistic overview of what to expect
- Reduced fear because all of these factors worked together to ease student anxiety about what it means to take an AP class



AP growth

Slow and steady enrollment growth!

Current Data

About 25% are taking an AP course (144 exams to be given in 2019)


21% or 47 students out of 229 Juniors and Seniors are dual enrolled




AP Total Enrollment

2019: 144 exams to be given*



Total HS pop and AP pop %


